School of Nursing *Reflections on the last ten years*

To all alumni from the School of Nursing, this year marks the tenth graduating class from CCHS, formerly CMHA School of Nursing. We will be graduating 64 students this year to join the ranks of the rest of you working as nurses in various hospitals

and other health care arenas. Over the past ten years, our reputation as a great school has continued to move forward, due to our dedicated faculty and our focus on students. We have received SACS and NLN accreditation as well as maintained solid approval and commendations from the Board of Nursing.

My position in the school has changed over the years, going from Level Coordinator, to Acting Director, to associate Director, to Director and now, Dean. Just as I have changed titles, so has the school changed, from Charlotte Memorial School of Nursing, to Charlotte Mecklenburg Hospital Authority School of Nursing, to Carolinas College of Health Sciences as other programs within the System joined us at the college.

We are currently admitting about 100 students a year, having gone from 40 initially to 88-100 admissions per year. Our pass rate for the NCLEX exam has stayed at a steady rate of 90 - 100% (with the exception of last year when we had an unexpected drop to the 80's). We believe this year will prove to be another year of great achievement for both the students and the faculty.

We always look forward to having you come back to see us. Special thanks to those who were able to join us for the Alumni Homecoming last fall. It was a great time for everyone. Some of you have gone on to do great things and we love to hear of your successes. Some have passed away - Robin Turner this winter (see *Alumni Pathways*).

Please keep us informed when you move or as your life changes. We are very

proud of all of you and consider your successes ours.

CCHS Goes to Italy! *Won't You Join Us?*



This can all be yours!

The glory that was Rome.....
the Colosseum, the Forum!
The romance of Venice.....
gondolas, glass blowers!
The art of Florence.....Michelangelo's
David, the Uffizi, the market!

Spring of 2002 marks the first annual CCHS alumni trip. Be a charter member of this adventurous group as we travel to Milan, Venice, Florence, Orvieto, and Rome. (Optional visits to Siena, San Gimignano, and Pompeii, Padua, Pisa).

Where do we go?

We leave Charlotte on March 4, 2002, and arrive in Milan the following morning. Our own bilingual guide travels with us on our private bus to Venice for a full day of guided sightseeing. We will visit the Gothic Doge's Palace, the Basilica of St. Mark (a 900-year-old mosaic of Byzantine, Romanesque, and Islamic influence) in which are the entombed remains of St. Mark the Evangelist! After a second, free day in Venice (optional guided excursions are available), we board our bus to travel across the plains of Po' Valley to Florence, birthplace of the Italian language, the Renaissance, and opera. A guided city tour includes the duomo, the church of Santa Croce (where the tombs of Galileo, Michelangelo, and Dante are displayed). On a second, free day in Florence, make your own agenda: visit the Uffizi Gallery, stroll along the Arno River, shop for leather goods in the open air market, or visit the statue of David, sculpted when Michelangelo was only 26! Or join an optional excursion to Pisa. Onward to Rome the following day, stopping at the ancient Etruscan stronghold of Orvieto, a lovely town situated on a stunning pedestal of volcanic rock. A full day of guided sightseeing in Rome includes the Colosseum and the Forum (required video before the trip: Russell Crowe in *The Gladiator!*). Optional excursions in Rome might include a visit to the catacombs the Vatican, or a trip to Pompeii. On March 15, we return to Charlotte.

What's included in the price?

- Round trip air from Charlotte. (Other gateways available; price may vary).
- Airport greeting and escort to hotel.
- Hotel accommodations each night.
- Breakfast each day.
- Three dinners.
- Hotel portage.

- All group transfers.
- Guided sightseeing in each major city.
- Some entrance fees.
- Full time bilingual tour director.
- Departure fees.

Wow. That's a lot. What is not included?

- Any meals not listed above.
- Any optional tours selected. (Sample: full day wine tasting in Tuscany - \$59; Vatican City - \$55; Pisa - \$39; Padua - \$33; Pompeii with lunch - \$69; Dinner with tenors in Rome - \$59; Gondola ride and dinner - \$53).

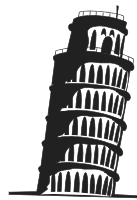

Your Wealth

You Built It; You Preserved It.....Bestow It Cautiously

A young man I know was angry following the reading of his wealthy father's will. Though the young man had inherited a handsome sum, large enough to guarantee he need never go hungry, he bitterly objected to the generous amounts the old man had left to loyal housekeepers, groundsmen, and a favorite charity. "He didn't know what he was doing," the young man bitterly argued. "He was thinking with his heart not his head." Indeed. And I suspect drafting that will, pondering the disposition of his estate, and "thinking with his heart" brought immeasurable pleasure to the old man.

One of the most important decisions we make, and one of the most difficult, is what to do with the wealth that we amass during our lifetime. 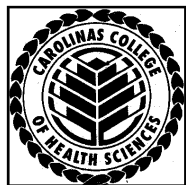
